This study employed both quantitative and qualitative research methodologies. The mixed-method approach allowed for a comprehensive understanding of the system's design, implementation, and impact.

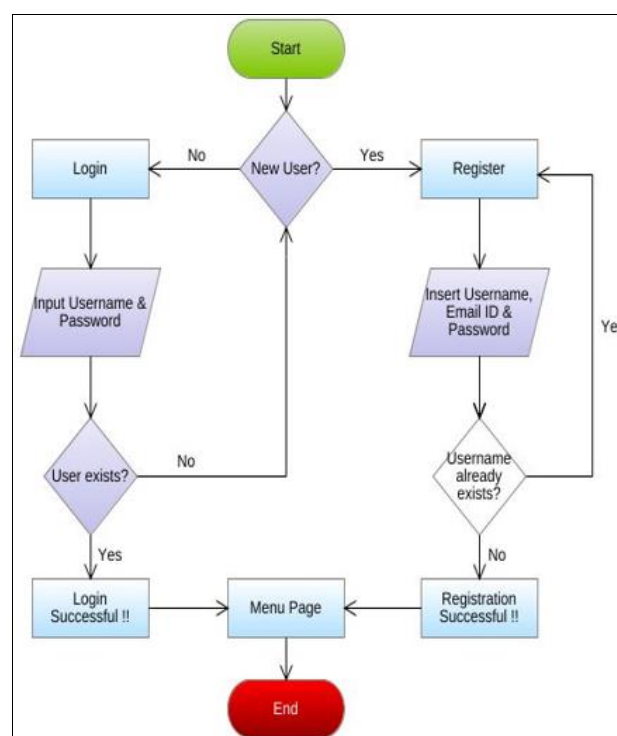
Hardware
