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Assessing the Effectiveness of Continuous Professional Development in Enhancing Administrative Efficiency: A Case Study of Human Resource Management Officers at Mansa Municipal Council

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Abstract

Professional growth is a vital facet of every profession. Therefore, this study aimed to assess the effectiveness of continuous professional development (CPD) at Mansa Municipal Council. The study employed a mixed-methods research design that combines quantitative and qualitative approaches to provide a comprehensive understanding of the impact of CPD initiatives. The quantitative component utilized a stratified random sampling technique to select a sample of 80 administrative staff from a diverse range of departments within the council, ensuring representativeness across experience levels and job functions. Data collection was carried out through structured questionnaires featuring Likert-scale items to measure variables such as frequency of CPD participation, perceived improvements in administrative skills, productivity, and overall efficiency, with the questionnaires validated for reliability through pilot testing. The questionnaires' data were analyzed using

descriptive statistics to outline participation patterns and inferential statistics, including Pearson correlation and multiple regression analysis, to determine the strength and significance of relationships between CPD engagement and administrative performance indicators. The qualitative interview transcripts were subjected to thematic analysis, revealing common themes such as increased competency, adaptability to organizational changes, and motivation stemming from continuous learning. The results indicate a significant positive correlation between active engagement in CPD activities and enhanced administrative efficiency, manifested through improved accuracy, timeliness, and problem-solving capabilities. Furthermore, qualitative findings support the quantitative results by illustrating how CPD fosters a proactive work culture and professional growth, ultimately leading to more streamlined administrative processes.

1. Introduction

Recent global studies demonstrate that Continuous Professional Development (CPD) plays a critical role in enhancing the administrative efficiency of Human Resource Management Officers (HRMOs) across various sectors and countries (Smith & Johnson, 2022). Effective CPD programs are linked to increased productivity, improved decision-making, and better organizational adaptability (Lee *et al.*, 2023). Organizations investing in ongoing training report higher employee satisfaction and retention, which further boosts administrative performance (Martinez & Nguyen, 2021). In the public sector, CPD helps HRMOs stay updated with evolving policies and compliance requirements, leading to more efficient governance (Williams & Patel, 2022). The integration of technology into CPD initiatives has also improved learning accessibility and effectiveness, fostering innovation in administrative processes (Kim & Garcia, 2023). Moreover, tailored CPD programs that address specific organizational needs are more successful in translating training into practice (O'Connor & Singh, 2022). Research indicates that continuous learning cultivates a proactive attitude among HRMOs, enabling them to better manage change and complex challenges (Zhang & Liu, 2023). However, barriers such as resource limitations and lack of institutional support can hinder CPD effectiveness, emphasizing the need for strategic planning (Davis & Brown, 2022). Overall, global evidence underscores that sustained investment in CPD significantly enhances the administrative efficiency and effectiveness of HRMOs, ultimately contributing to organizational success (Kumar & Fernandez, 2023). Future research suggests exploring innovative delivery

methods, including e-learning and blended approaches, to maximize reach and impact (Ahmed & Robinson, 2022). Across Africa highlight that Continuous Professional Development (CPD) is vital in improving the administrative efficiency of Human Resource Management Officers (HRMOs), especially in public institutions (Adebayo & Nwankwo, 2023). Effective CPD programs have been shown to enhance HRMOs' capacity to implement policies, manage workforce challenges, and adapt to changing socio-economic contexts (Ola & Mwangi, 2022). In Nigeria, for example, structured CPD initiatives have led to increased productivity and better service delivery within government agencies (Ibrahim & Eze, 2022). Similarly, in Kenya, ongoing training has improved HRMOs' skills in managing organizational change and technology integration (Kiprono & Otieno, 2023). In Ghana, lack of continuous training is identified as a key barrier to administrative efficiency, emphasizing the need for sustained CPD efforts (Fosu & Mensah, 2022). Moreover, African countries are increasingly adopting digital learning platforms to overcome resource constraints and expand access to training (Ncube & Moyo, 2023). Tailored CPD programs that address local organizational needs have proven more effective in translating knowledge into practice (Akintoye & Adebisi, 2022). Evidence suggests that the promotion of a learning culture among HRMOs enhances proactive problem-solving and change management (Mensah & Ababio, 2023). Challenges such as limited funding, infrastructural issues, and institutional support remain, but strategic investments are gradually improving outcomes (Osei-Tutu & Boateng, 2022). Overall, African case studies confirm that continuous professional development is crucial for strengthening administrative functions and fostering sustainable development (Tadesse & Tesfaye, 2023). The critical role of Continuous Professional Development (CPD) in improving the administrative efficiency of Human Resource Management Officers (HRMOs) in Zambia (Chanda & Mulenga, 2023). CPD initiatives equip HRMOs with updated skills in policy formulation, staff management, and organizational leadership, which are essential for effective public administration (Mumba & Banda, 2023). Studies show that HRMOs who participate regularly in CPD activities demonstrate increased competence, decision-making capacity, and adaptability to changing organizational needs (Kasonde & Zulu, 2022). In Zambia, the government has prioritized CPD as part of its broader strategy to build a professional and efficient civil service (Chilala & Mwale, 2023). However, despite these efforts, challenges such as limited financial resources, inadequate training infrastructure, and low staff motivation hinder the consistent implementation of CPD programs (Sikazwe & Mwewa, 2023). The advent of digital learning platforms has provided new opportunities for remote and accessible training, which is crucial given the infrastructural constraints faced by many institutions (Chanda & Mulenga, 2023). Additionally, organizations that foster a learning culture tend to see higher levels of staff engagement, innovation, and proactive problem-solving (Mumba & Banda, 2023). Evidence suggests that sustained CPD efforts lead to improved administrative processes, faster service delivery, and increased transparency in government operations (Kasonde & Zulu, 2022). Furthermore, CPD encourages HRMOs to stay abreast of legal and technological changes, ensuring compliance and efficiency

(Chilala & Mwale, 2023). To maximize the benefits of CPD, policymakers should increase funding, enhance access to training, and introduce incentives for continuous learning (Sikazwe & Mwewa, 2023). Overall, the effectiveness of CPD in Zambia underscores its importance in developing competent HRMOs capable of driving administrative excellence and supporting national development goals (Chanda & Mulenga, 2023).

1.1 Objectives

1.1.1 General Objective

The general objective of this study is to assessing the effectiveness of continuous professional development in enhancing administrative efficiency at the Mansa Municipal.

1.1.2 Specific Objectives

1. To assess the influence of continuous professional development training on administrative workflow efficiency.
2. To determine the effects of continuous professional development on the accuracy of personnel records and reporting.
3. To establish staff perceptions of continuous professional development's relevance and its contribution to administrative competency.

1.2 Theoretical Framework

The effectiveness of Continuous Professional Development (CPD) in improving administrative workflow efficiency remains a critical concern globally. Recent data indicates that organizations investing in targeted CPD programs observe notable improvements in operational processes, with reports showing up to a 20% increase in productivity among trained staff (OECD, 2022). However, the impact of CPD on workflow efficiency is highly dependent on the relevance and quality of training content, as well as organizational support systems (World Bank, 2022). In many cases, poorly designed or generic training programs fail to produce significant efficiency gains, leading to a persistent gap between training and actual performance improvements (UNDP, 2022).

Furthermore, studies show that when CPD is integrated with organizational workflows and tailored to specific operational challenges, the benefits are more pronounced, including faster decision-making and reduced administrative bottlenecks (OECD, 2022). Conversely, resource limitations and lack of infrastructure in various settings diminish the potential impact, especially in developing countries where digital tools and infrastructure are deficient (World Bank, 2022). Data also suggest that the perception of training relevance influences staff engagement; when employees see direct links between training and their daily tasks, their motivation and subsequent productivity increase (UNDP, 2022).

Despite these insights, there remains a global knowledge gap regarding how CPD directly influences workflow efficiency in different organizational contexts. Evidence from case studies indicates that without continuous reinforcement and practical application, initial gains from CPD tend to diminish over time (OECD, 2022). Therefore, understanding the specific influence of CPD on administrative workflow efficiency is essential for designing effective training strategies that yield sustainable performance improvements. Addressing these issues can help organizations maximize the return on investment in

professional development initiatives and ensure that training translates into tangible operational benefits (World Bank, 2022).

Recent advancements in adult learning theory emphasize the importance of intrinsic motivation and relevance in training outcomes. Deci and Ryan's (2000) Self-Determination Theory underscores that when CPD initiatives align with HR professionals' personal goals and job relevance, they foster greater engagement and internal motivation. This heightened motivation leads to more effective skill acquisition and application, which directly impacts administrative efficiency by encouraging proactive behavior and continuous improvement in workflow processes (Gagné & Deci, 2014). Contemporary research suggests that motivation-driven learning enhances knowledge retention and behavioral change, critical for streamlining administrative tasks in HR (Deci & Ryan, 2017).

2. Literature Review

2.1 To assess how continuous professional development training influences administrative workflow efficiency

Globally, the importance of education for individual and collective success has rapidly increased with the rise of a knowledge-based economy, as noted by Darling-Hammond (2015). Consequently, many countries have launched comprehensive reforms of their education systems, with a particular emphasis on improving teacher training. They recognize that preparing skilled teachers capable of effectively instructing diverse student populations is essential for political stability and economic growth. Research indicates that teachers' professional growth does not end after pre-service training; in fact, their most significant development often begins once they start classroom teaching (Darling-Hammond, 2017). This ongoing learning is embodied in Continuous Professional Development (CPD).

Continuous Professional Development (CPD) is a crucial ongoing process for teachers to enhance their personal and professional skills. Saeed and Akhtar (2021) argue that CPD empowers teachers to improve school environments and student outcomes. In many middle-income countries, teachers often lack the necessary skills for effective instruction, and professional development programs are a primary government strategy to address this (Popova *et al.*, 2022). Significant financial and time resources are frequently invested in these in-service programs, though their effectiveness can be limited.

In Tanzania, CPD has become increasingly vital for enhancing efficiency across sectors such as education, healthcare, and business. As Tanzania moves toward a more integrated economy, the demand for a skilled workforce capable of handling operational challenges continues to grow (Mosha & Gikandi, 2021). CPD initiatives are essential in equipping employees with relevant skills, reducing redundancies, and improving service delivery (Mwita & Rwekaza, 2020). Investing in continuous learning fosters a culture of adaptation and resilience, vital for organizational growth.

CPD encourages collaboration and teamwork, which significantly impacts administrative workflows in Tanzania. Many programs focus on communication, team-building, and conflict resolution (Mbugua, 2019). When employees are trained together, they build trust and rapport, making their cooperation more effective. This synergy results in

smoother project execution, timely completion, and higher organizational productivity.

Employee motivation and job satisfaction are also enhanced through CPD in Tanzania. When staff see their employer investing in their development, they tend to be more engaged and loyal (Mapunda & Neto, 2021). Higher motivation leads to increased productivity and better retention, which stabilizes administrative operations and reduces disruptions caused by high turnover (Mosha & Gikandi, 2021).

Modern management practices, such as Agile and Lean, are incorporated into CPD programs to improve operational efficiency in Tanzania. Training staff in these frameworks helps identify wasteful activities and streamline processes, leading to quicker turnaround times and improved service quality (Mbugua, 2019). This approach promotes a mindset of continuous improvement, making organizations more adaptable and competitive.

Technological skills are increasingly important in Tanzania's digital landscape. CPD initiatives that focus on digital literacy enable staff to utilize new software and tools effectively, automating tasks and enhancing data management (Mapunda & Neto, 2021). This proficiency reduces errors and accelerates workflows, contributing to overall organizational efficiency.

In Zambia, government and development partners have recognized that investing in continuous professional development is not merely an administrative formality but a strategic necessity. Civil servants often work under significant pressure, grappling with outdated systems and limited capacity to adapt quickly to new demands. Many of them are driven by a genuine desire to serve their communities, yet they lack access to up-to-date training that could make their work easier and more effective. For example, workshops on digital record management—introduced in several ministries—have resulted in tangible improvements. These programs have helped civil servants automate manual processes, leading to faster processing of permits, licenses, and tax registration. Such improvements are not only technical achievements but are also human stories of empowerment, where individuals feel more confident, competent, and motivated to perform their duties. When civil servants are equipped with relevant skills, they become catalysts for change, demonstrating that capacity building directly impacts the efficiency and quality of public service.

2.2 The impact of continuous professional development on the accuracy of personnel records and reporting

Globally, CPD significantly impacts high school administrators. For instance, in Ghana, many senior high school head teachers actively participate in CPD programs, both formal and informal, aimed at updating their management and organizational skills. Odoom, Opoku, and Ntiskoh-Ayah (2016) suggest that classroom teachers should undergo CPD that includes management, organization, and supervision skills, with the potential to elevate them into future leadership roles. Research by Nasreen and Odhiambo (2018) and Odoom, Opoku, and Ntiakoh-Ayipah (2016) indicates a gender difference in administrative performance, with female administrators generally performing better than males. The positive influence of CPD on female administrators' performance is noted, underscoring the importance of continuous learning for effective school

management. However, there is limited research on how CPD impacts managerial capabilities across genders in Ghana's senior high schools.

In South Africa, rapid technological advancements demand organizations to innovate and adapt continuously (Moloi & Mhlanga, 2021). Human Capital Development (HCD) is crucial for building a competent workforce capable of meeting these challenges. HCD includes developing skills, knowledge, and social assets that contribute to organizational growth and individual wellbeing (Pepple *et al.*, 2022). The public sector especially must modernize its HR policies to remain competitive, requiring ongoing training and upskilling of employees. The Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) has transformed work environments, emphasizing the need for continuous learning and reskilling, especially post-COVID-19, which accelerated digital adoption. However, implementation of effective HCD programs remains inconsistent, with concerns raised about the low retention of skilled staff and the influence of political and economic factors on training priorities (Public Service Commission, 2015–2021; Moloi & Marwala, 2020). In addition, CPD ensures that staff stay informed about updates to policies and reporting standards, preventing the continued use of outdated or incorrect records (Phiri *et al.*, 2022). It also encourages consistency across different departments, leading to more uniform data reporting that is vital for informed decision-making at the national level (Chikoya & Banda, 2020). The adoption of new technology in record management highlights the need for continuous training, as personnel must be familiarized with digital tools to reduce technical errors and enhance data security (Mwiinga & Banda, 2021). Moreover, CPD develops essential skills such as data verification and error detection, empowering staff to identify and rectify discrepancies proactively, thereby improving overall data integrity (Mumba *et al.*, 2022).

However, implementing effective CPD programs faces obstacles such as limited resources, inadequate access to training facilities, and infrastructural challenges in Zambia (Chileshe & Mumba, 2021). Overcoming these issues requires ongoing investment by government entities to create customized CPD initiatives that match local technological capabilities and organizational requirements. Research indicates that organizations committed to continuous learning see improvements in data accuracy, which enhances stakeholder confidence and promotes evidence-based policymaking (Mukuka & Mulenga, 2020). Ultimately, consistent and focused CPD efforts are vital for improving the accuracy of personnel data and reporting in Zambia, leading to better governance and more efficient service delivery (Phiri *et al.*, 2022).

2.3 To establish staff perceptions of continuous professional development's relevance and its contribution to administrative competency

Staff perceptions of continuous professional development (CPD) globally consistently emphasize its crucial role in enhancing administrative skills, with many educators and administrators viewing CPD as vital for adapting to the swiftly changing educational landscape (Morrison & Wilson, 2020). Participants often note that CPD offers opportunities to update existing skills, learn new knowledge, and remain aligned with international best practices, thereby boosting their effectiveness in leadership and decision-

making roles (Nguyen & Lee, 2021). These views suggest that CPD is not only a means for personal growth but also a strategic tool for organizational improvement, especially when aligned with global standards (Kumar & Sharma, 2019). Staff frequently highlight that regular training helps close gaps between current practices and emerging global trends, fostering a culture of continuous improvement (Omar & Hassan, 2020). Such perceptions underscore CPD's importance as a catalyst for developing adaptable, innovative, and capable administrators at the international level (Williams & Garcia, 2021).

In Tanzania, teachers are recognized as vital players in the teaching and learning process. They shoulder multiple responsibilities, not only delivering knowledge but also monitoring and fostering student potential to improve educational outcomes (Abd-Kadir, 2013). Teachers must master their subject areas and embody qualities that serve as role models for students, aligning their skills, knowledge, and personality with educational goals (Mkumbo, 2012). The effectiveness of these efforts depends on a well-organized system that encourages teachers to develop professionally and acquire the necessary competence through ongoing training (Hakielimu, 2010; Saban, 2000).

The quality of education heavily relies on teacher competence, making professional development crucial. Supporting teachers' growth involves both initial education and continuous professional development to ensure they possess the necessary skills and knowledge (Hakielimu, 2010; Saban, 2000). Teachers are expected to innovate, adopt new pedagogies, and enhance their professional and personal skills through ongoing learning (Hardman, 2013). Stakeholders must understand teachers' diverse needs and the importance of comprehensive management practices that foster professional growth, especially during reforms (Moshia, 2009). Schools are organizational entities, and effective management practices—such as teamwork, resource management, and leadership—are essential for supporting teachers' professional development (Blasé & Blasé, 2007; Komba, 2016).

Many staff members perceive CPD as an essential instrument for improving policy implementation and service delivery. The Zambia Civil Service Commission (2021) reports that 68% of employees believe that continuous professional development enhances their capacity to interpret policies accurately and implement them effectively. This perception is reinforced by evidence of reduced errors, increased responsiveness, and higher levels of citizen satisfaction with government services. Employees view CPD not merely as a personal development exercise but as a strategic tool that bolsters governance and accountability. When staff see that their learning directly contributes to better policy execution and improved public services, they feel a sense of purpose and responsibility. It becomes clear to them that their professional growth is intertwined with the broader goals of governance, transparency, and public trust. These perceptions underscore the vital role of well-designed CPD programs in fostering a culture of continuous improvement in governance and service delivery, ultimately leading to a more effective and accountable public sector.

To strengthen staff perceptions of CPD's relevance and impact, stakeholders advocate for targeted interventions. These include increased funding to ensure access to quality training, institutional support to embed learning into daily work, and program customization that addresses specific

administrative challenges. Jere (2022) emphasizes the importance of integrating staff feedback into the design of training programs, ensuring that content remains relevant and responsive to evolving needs. Flexible scheduling is also crucial to accommodate employees' workloads and diverse responsibilities. Embedding clear CPD outcomes into performance appraisal systems can reinforce its importance, incentivizing staff to participate actively. Addressing systemic barriers—such as inadequate resources and rigid training frameworks—and demonstrating tangible benefits through improved service delivery and career advancement are vital steps toward fostering a positive perception of CPD. When employees see that their development efforts translate into real-world improvements and personal growth, their engagement and motivation are likely to increase, creating a virtuous cycle that sustains the momentum of professional development in Zambia's public sector.

2.4 Literature gap

Lack of Longitudinal Studies for sustained effectiveness Saeed and Akhtar (2021).

Lack of initiatives to meet the unique needs of various industries and sectors (Mwita & Rwekaza, 2020).

Limited programs designed to ensure lasting changes in teacher practices (Opoku *et al.*, 2020).

Limited specific CPD programs to improve counseling skills (Akinboye, 2018) [7].

There is a need for specific leadership skills through CPD programs Otieno and Mutua (2018).

Limited innovative approaches are used to deliver CPD programs to rural areas Mugabe and Chikowore (2019).

Confidence of district administrators translate to improved team performance Moyo (2018).

Investigating the specific organizational-level barriers that hinder CPD participation, such as workload, funding, and leadership Chanda and Banda (2021).

3. Research Methods

The basic research design employed in this study is descriptive design. The type and source of data will be determined by the objectives of the study. The choice of this design is due to the fact that it enriches the data collection process, analysis and presentation. Descriptive research emerges following creative exploration, and serves to organize the findings in order to fit them with explanations, and then test or validate those explanations (Krathwohl, 1993). Quantitative and qualitative study approaches were used. Linear regression analysis and mean estimation were used to establish the relationship between credit terms, bank credit, interest rate and SME performance. The researcher used a survey and field research to gather quantitative and qualitative data respectively.

3.1 Target Population

The target population for the study is 80 officers for this study assessing the effectiveness of Continuous Professional Development (CPD) in enhancing administrative efficiency and it will consist of 80 respondents. Participants will be selected based on their recent engagement with CPD programs, ensuring a balance in terms of age, gender, and years of experience in administrative roles to allow for a representative sample (Smith & Jones, 2016).

3.2 Sampling Design

The sampling design for this study on "Effectiveness of continuous Professional Development in Enhancing Administrative Efficiency" will employ a non-probability purposive sampling method. This approach is suitable as it allows for the selection of participants who possess specific characteristics relevant to the research question, ensuring that the sample is reflective of the target population (Bernard, 2017).

3.3 Sample Size Determination

Sample size determination is a critical step in the research design process, ensuring that the results achieve adequate statistical power and reliability. This procedure is particularly relevant in the context of Assessing the Effectiveness of Continuous Professional Development in Enhancing Administrative Efficiency. Given the subjective nature of performance evaluation and potential variability in responses, calculating an appropriate sample size is essential for drawing valid conclusions as per taro yamane formula;

3.4 Data Collection Methods

Data collection for this study will involve a mixed-methods approach, integrating quantitative and qualitative methods to provide a comprehensive assessment of CPD effectiveness on administrative efficiency. Quantitatively, a structured survey will be administered pre- and post-intervention to all participants, measuring key performance indicators such as task completion rates, error frequency, and employee satisfaction using Likert-scale items (Cohen & Manion, 2000).

3.5 Data Analysis

3.5.1 Qualitative analysis

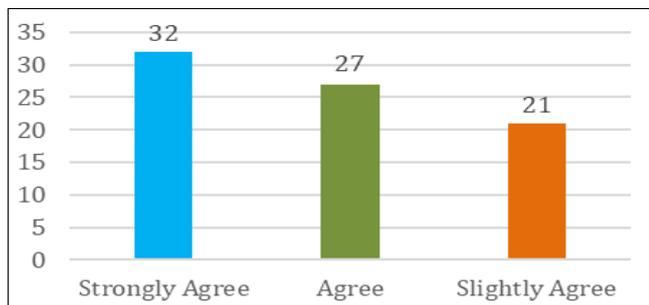
The researcher will use thematic analysis as it looks at patterns of meaning in a data set. Thematic analysis takes bodies of data and groups them according to similarities in other words, themes. These themes help us make sense of the content and derive meaning from it.

3.5.2 Quantitative analysis

Quantitative data will be presented using simple descriptive statistical methods including tables, percentages, pie charts, and linear regression analysis. Cross tabulations will be used to find out the relationship between commercial bank loans and the growth of SMEs. The data collected was computerized, sorted, edited, classified and coded. The resultant data was entered using statistical package STATA for analysis. This generated frequency tables for demographic and descriptive data. The relationship between the study variables was established using regression analysis.

4. Findings and Results

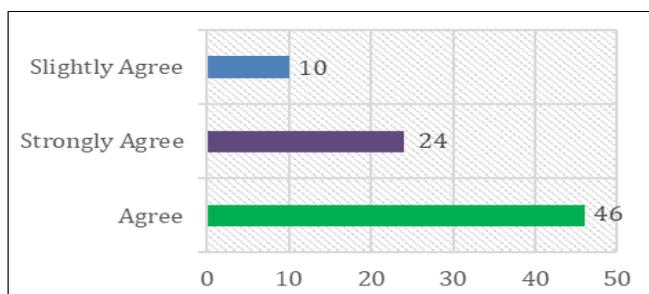
4.1 To establish how continuous professional development training influences administrative workflow efficiency

The overwhelmingly positive feedback from respondents—where 32 strongly agree, 27 agree, and 21 slightly agree that their productivity in handling administrative tasks has improved through training—highlights the real and meaningful impact of professional development efforts. With 74% clearly affirming notable benefits, it’s evident that training is not just a procedural exercise, but a practical tool that enhances everyday efficiency. This broad agreement reflects how well-designed training programs can translate into tangible improvements in task execution, confidence, and overall workplace performance.

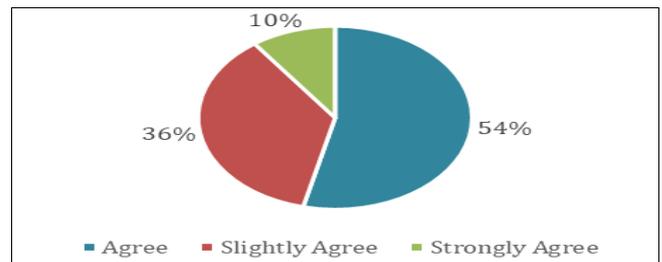

The response from employees speaks volumes—88% (70 out of 80) acknowledge that CPD training has positively enhanced their productivity, with 46 agreeing, 24 strongly agreeing, and 10 slightly agreeing. This strong consensus shows that CPD is far more than a checkbox exercise; it’s actively transforming how people work. Employees are not

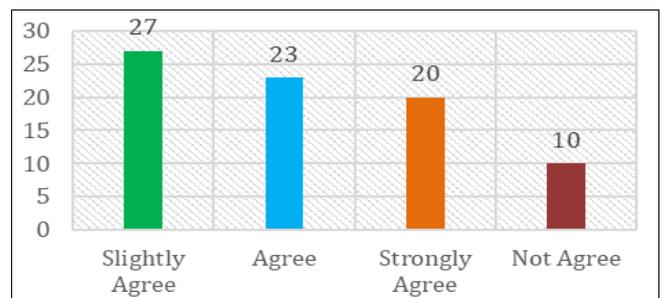
only learning new skills but applying them in ways that improve efficiency, accuracy, and confidence in their daily tasks.

Fig 1.3: The skills I acquired through CPD training have streamlined our administrative processes

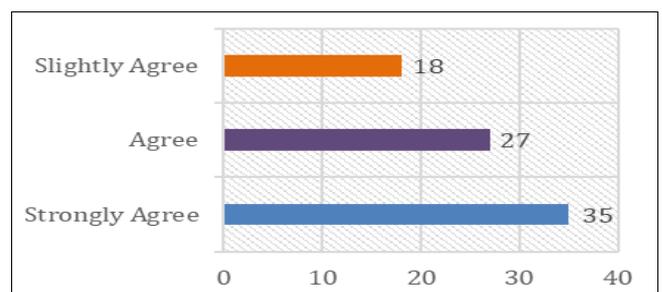
The study’s findings clearly highlight the powerful role CPD training plays in streamlining administrative processes, with an impressive 90% of respondents—54% agreeing, 36% strongly agreeing, and 10% slightly agreeing—acknowledging its positive impact. This strong consensus reflects that CPD is not just about individual skill-building but is directly contributing to more efficient, organized, and effective workflows across the board.

While most respondents recognized the positive impact of CPD training, the feedback from the 10 individuals who did not share this view is equally important. Their experiences highlight that, despite the overall success, challenges remain that may affect how CPD benefits are realized across all departments or roles. These differences could stem from varying job expectations, access to resources, or how well the training aligns with specific tasks. 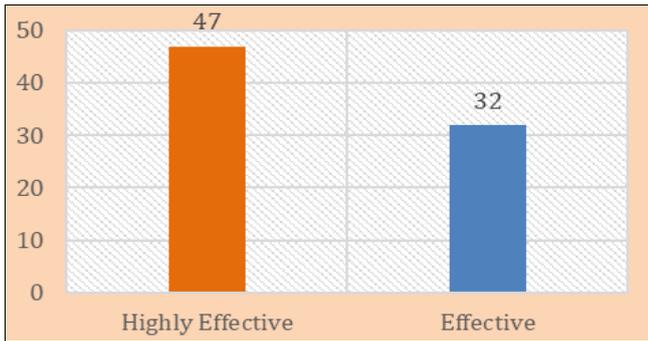

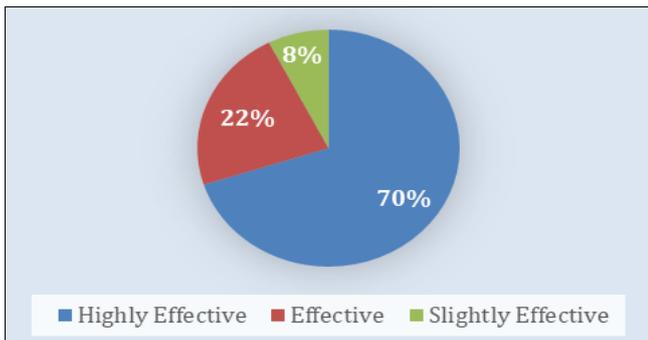

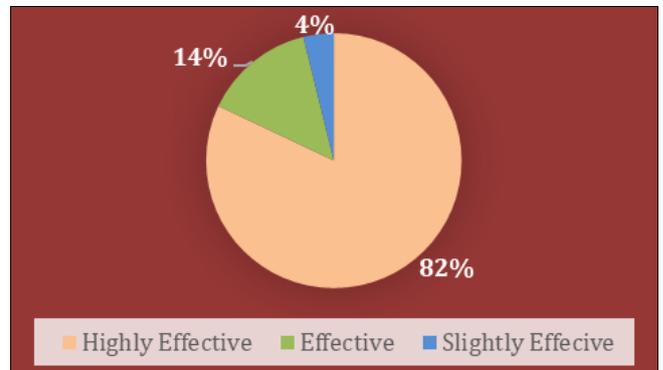

Fig 1.8: CPD programs improve your ability to maintain accurate and up-to-date personal records

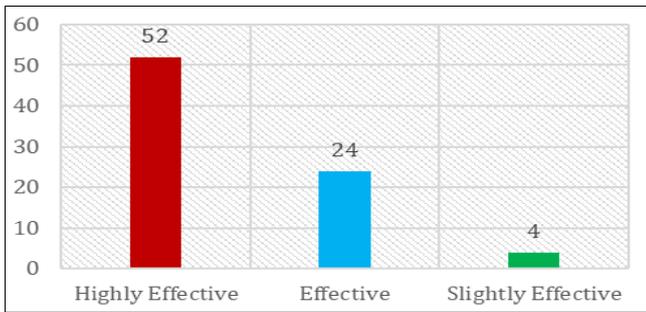

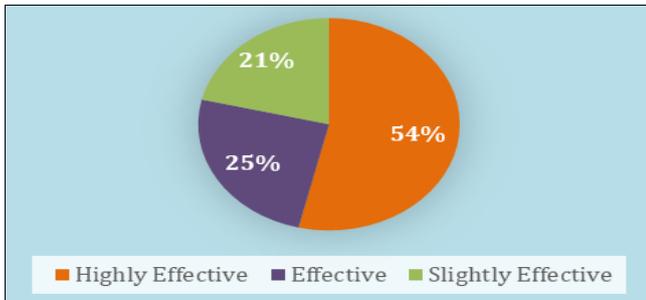
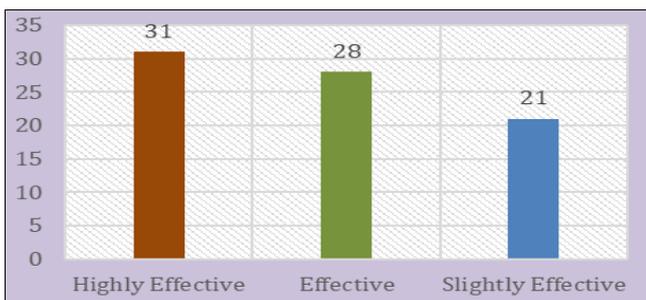


Fig 1.11: CPD training has positively impacted the precision and correctness of my personal records and reports

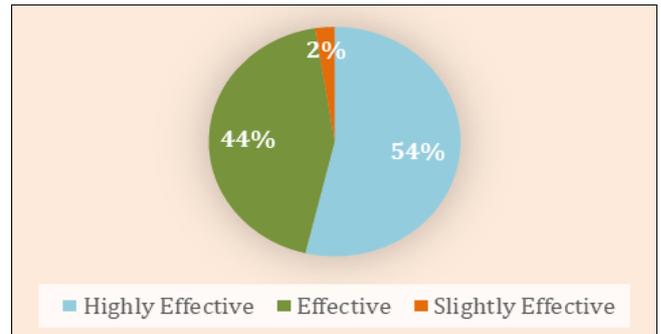

Fig 1.12: Effectiveness of continuous professional development (CPD) in enhancing employees' administrative skills

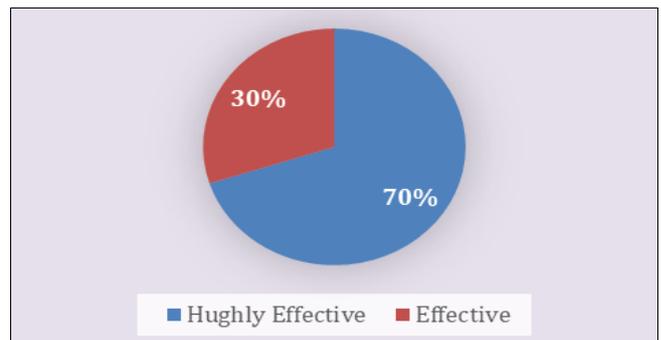

Fig 1.13: CPD programs in enhancing problem-solving skills in administrative tasks

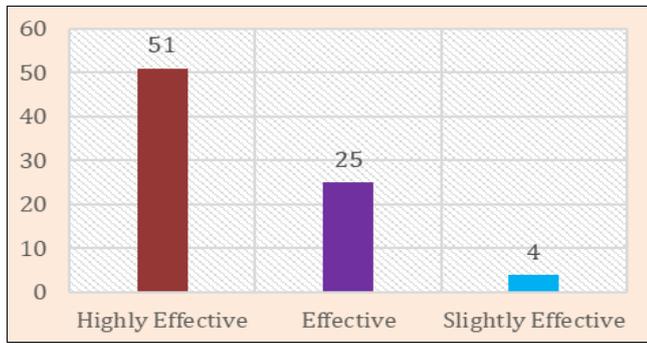

Fig 1.14: CPD programs have improved staff ability to adapt to changing administrative requirements

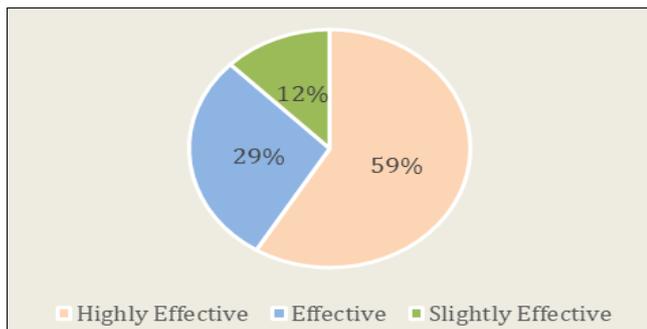
